A Message from the Pastor



"Make your motions and cast your votes, but God has the final say" (Proverbs 16:33, MSG).

Who will you vote for on election day? Voting has become one of

the most polarizing issues in the country. We are often quick to describe our opinion on an issue by criticizing or dismissing others who express alternate views. There are over 71,000 registered voters in Cape May County, and ballots cast totaled 59%. Voting is an essential opportunity for every eligible citizen to participate in civic conversation.

The Gallup Poll folks say that year in and year out, we vote when the issues matter to us. What matters to you?

When we vote for the candidates of our choice, we are making a statement about ourselves.

"My vote doesn't matter!" is a myth because it denies the value we place on ourselves, and intrinsically possess. If we choose not to vote and not participate in the structures of government whether at City Hall or the local church, we make a statement about how much we value our own ideas. Your ideas matter!

Those who refuse to accept the responsibility to be involved implicitly cast a vote about their own self-worth by their silence in the election process. Make every effort to participate.

The implication of our form of government (United States as well as Presbyterian) is that we all have something to offer. We may not all be as loud or (better) articulate as the next person, but let's not forget that we are all created to be communicators of ideas, and creators of possibilities. That's what Cold Spring Presbyterian Church represents to. The greater Cape May community, possibilities that are empowered by the Spirit as we follow Jesus Christ.

According to Peter Block writing about building thriving neighborhoods, "the core question is this: What is the means through which those of us who care about the whole community can create a future for ourselves that is not just an improvement, but one of a different nature from what we now have?" (Peter Block, *Community*, 2008, p 33).

Our ideas and perspectives are full of value! We are created in the image of God. We can choose to be creative in expressing our own uniqueness at home, and the office, at church, in the community, when we participate with others. We make a positive statement that we are important, our community is important, and we have something to say when we vote. Over the past few years more and more of us are volunteering, offering gifts, getting involved in ways that matter to them, and the community is noticing. More and more people are finding resources they really want from our community of faith. Thank you for participating in God's mission to *Energize Spirits and Transform Lives!*

What you think about yourself is the bottom line. "Will you be at the polls Tuesday?" And after Election Day, how will you get more involved to be an even greater blessing to others around you?!

Pay attention to the issues and the candidates who are vying for political leadership. Take time for living the life Jesus invites us all to enjoy. Vote for yourself, then for the candidates of your choice. Let others know you take your ideas seriously. I do.



"Resurrection Now"

Easter Sunday has come and gone, but the church season of Eastertide continues. Christ's Resurrection has come and gone, but the effect continues. Our personal celebration of both has come and gone, but has it continued? By faith and trust in God's Word, we know that our bodies will be resurrected, restored and glorified *someday* --in "the end times" on Judgment Day. But do we need to wait until then to experience a resurrection? Can we experience a kind of resurrection <u>now</u>? What does the resurrection of Jesus Christ mean for us <u>now</u>? Is the Easter Sunday celebration of Jesus' resurrection from the dead merely something we observe and ponder *once-a-year* every year, or is this most significant event in the course of human history presented to us to transform us in a personal way? I believe that we can get a "taste" of that process <u>now</u> -- by considering the resurrection of Jesus Christ as a personal life-changing *transformational experience!*

Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. Jesus raised Himself from the dead. Jesus overcame both death itself and the burden of our collective sins. Do we have such power? Relying upon our human resources alone, we cannot raise someone from the dead --especially ourselves! The wages of sin is death; rising with Christ is new life! (Rom.6:23) Jesus offers us a way of living "a resurrected life" now --helping us to overcome spiritual death from sin. How can we "tap into" Jesus' resurrection power? In what ways can we become "risen with Him"? Being aligned with the risen Christ, we are raised from our imperfect humanity into holiness. We became partakers of His life initially when we were baptized --becoming children of the Spirit (God) and not mere children of the flesh (Adam); later advancing through Confirmation --accepting and standing for God's commands and mandates; studying His Word in fellowship and offering gifts of service to His Body on earth: His church. What kinds of "resurrection" do we receive and experience?

Living a life of following Christ is a "resurrection experience"! My mind has been changed by *knowing* Him better; my heart has been changed by *loving* Him better; my soul has been changed by *identifying* with Him better; my body has been changed by *living* with Him better; and my attitude has been changed by *understanding* His perspective better! As the apostle Paul says, "we become a new creation; we become Christ-like!" (2 Cor.5:17; Phil.3:10)

Research studies and statistics seem to affirm that Christians, in general, live better lives. We are more generous with our time, energy, attention (TEA) and finances than most people of other world religions. Indeed the United States is the most generous and most humane nation in the history of mankind. What do you suppose accounts for that? What makes us such a *caring* and *giving* nation?

In the gospel account of John (18:17-18;25-27), Peter is warming himself by a fire pit at daybreak. He is confronted *three times* about his association with Jesus; each time, Peter denies knowing Christ --and the cock crowed as foretold. Following Christ's resurrection from the dead --also foretold, John writes about Peter again (21:15-17). The setting is strikingly similar: it is daybreak and Peter comes ashore to meet Jesus by a fire pit. Again, Peter is confronted *three times* about his association with Christ. He can choose to remain a fisherman or to accept Jesus' offer to accept a new calling, a new life, a *resurrected life* -- shepherding God's people, the church --the Body of Christ on earth! Do <u>you</u> desire this new resurrected life? Seek it and you will find it; the door will be open for you to serve. (Mt.7:7)

The Resurrection power of Jesus Christ <u>does</u> lift us above our fallen human nature; this singular momentous event *continues to transform* us into "new creations". Let us not simply observe Resurrection Sunday once a year; rather, let us embrace the opportunity to live "resurrected lives" <u>now</u> --and every day!
