Message Preview:

Rev. Jim Shanley's Message is titled, "Let's Talk About Gluttony (7 Deadly Suns)"

MUSIC PREVIEW:

The hymn "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah" was written by Welsh Methodist preacher William Williams of Pantycelyn in the 18th century to express a prayer for divine guidance, reflecting the Israelites' journey through the wilderness as described in the Book of Exodus. Williams drew on his own experiences as a traveling minister (he traversed over 100,000 miles in his ministry), and the harsh Welsh landscape to create a hymn about the universal Christian life as a pilgrimage through a barren land, a journey fraught with challenges but sustained by God's constant provision and protection.

The hymn "Just As I Am" was written by English hymn writer Charlotte Elliott in 1835 (1789–1871). She was a gifted artist and poet. who suffered a serious illness in her early thirties, becoming a lifelong invalid. Her chronic physical weakness and depression led her to feel useless, a

sentiment she expressed in her hymn. The hymn's message of coming to God just as one is, flaws and all, was inspired by Swiss minister César Malan's encouragement to a struggling, invalid Elliott. The hymn became incredibly popular, particularly in 19th-century revivals and used by evangelists like Billy Graham as a quintessential invitation hymn.

The hymn "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy" by Frederick W. Faber (1814–1863), a British priest who converted to Catholicism under the influence of John Henry Newman, is set to various melodies, including "Wellesley" by Lizzie Tourjee (1878) and "Babilone" by Julius E. Röntgen (1906). The "Babilone" melody is a traditional folk tune. Faber's text (1854), was derived from his longer poem "Come to Jesus," and both the text and its music were intended to convey God's boundless mercy and love,

SCRIPTURE READING: GENESIS 25: 24-34

When the time came for her to give birth, there were twin boys in her womb. The first to come out was red, and his whole body was like a hairy garment; so they named him Esau. After this, his brother came out, with his hand grasping Esau's heel; so he was named Jacob. Isaac was sixty years old when Rebekah gave birth to them. The boys grew up, and Esau became a skillful hunter, a man of the open country, while Jacob was content to stay at home among the tents. Isaac, who had a taste for wild game, loved Esau, but Rebekah loved Jacob. Once when Jacob was cooking some stew, Esau came in from the open country, famished. He said to Jacob, "Quick, let me have some of that

But Jacob said, "Swear to me first." So he swore an oath to him, selling his birthright to Jacob. Then Jacob gave Esau some bread and some lentil stew. He ate and drank, and then got up and left. So Esau despised his birthright.
